Indenture between Tobye Matthew of Gray's Inn, son and heir apparent of Tobye Bishop of Durham, and Dudley Carlton of London, esquire of the one part; and Sir. Thomas Leigh of Stonley, Warwick, and Thomas Spencer of Clardon in the same county, esquire, of the other part.

2 April Bishop leased to Toby Mathew that part of Duresme Place commonly called Duresme House in the Stronde, in the Parish of St. Martin's which is usually called, the Gate House, with all rooms, lodgings, edifices and buildings what so every adjoining thereunto, then in the occupation of Sir. Walter Raleigh or his assigns all between said Gate House on the east and the house or tenement in the street on the west, then or late in the occupation of Marta Tyen, widow, and Jasper Tyen, or either of them.

My interest was drawn to the above because of Jasper Tyen his daughter Anne Tyen would marry around the year 1625-1626 a young solicitor of Staples Inn which was connected to Gray's Inn listed above. Both Staples and Gray's Inn were branches of Chancery Court the young solicitor was Charles Harbord (1596-1679) he had begun in the Middle Temple in the year 1624. The courts were located in the same area of London that the dwelling house described in the above indenture where Jasper Tyen was living along with what appears to be his widowed mother or father (?) Marta Tyen . In 1605 Jasper daughter Anne who married Charles Harbord would in all likely hood would have been quite a small child possibly even a infant . After Anne and Charles marries they had two children a son Philip born about 1627 and a daughter Anne born about 1628 who grew up and in 1648 married Richard Newman "Jr." AKA Justice Newman. This line is the main focus of my research they would have been my deceased father-in-law Hilton Lee Robins 7th G-Grandparents. Of course this would make Charles Harbord and Anne Tyen his 8th Great and Anne father Jasper Tyen was his 9th.

Please note Jasper was next-door neighbors with The Sir. Walter Raleigh who had been placed in the Tower in 1603 for his part in a plot to oust King James I. Raleigh was given death but won his appeal and his life was spared he remained in the Tower until 1616 at which time he was released and allowed to go at his expense to Spanish territory to look for gold. When he returned in 1618 he had found no gold and had burned a Spanish village for which he received the reinstatement of his original death séance and was beheaded. (Just an interesting historical prospective note)

Charles first wife Anne died after the birth of the only two known children her death year appears to have been by about 1633 as his second wife birthed their first child William 25 April 1635.

In 1631 Charles Harbord was appointed Surveyor-gen by and for King Charles 1 which he served until 1642 (English Civil War) at which time he and his second wife Mary Van Aeist (Dutch) took their family removing to Holland returning after the fall of King Charles I and continuing his prosperity under the Proctor.
